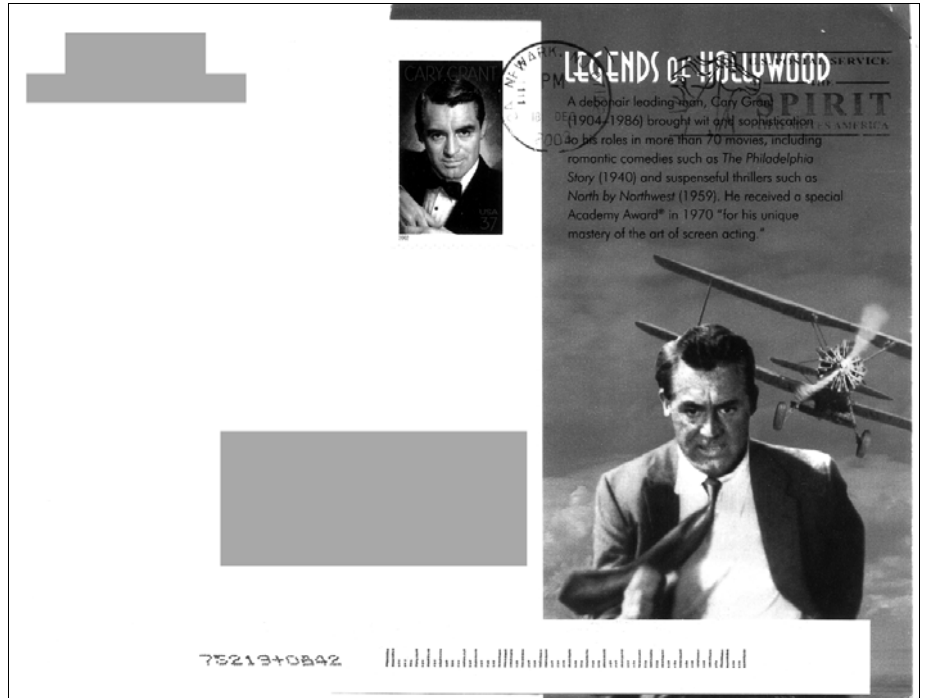

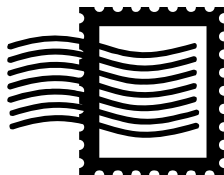

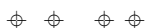

## News from the Editor

With this "late" December issue, I should be back on track with timely journals. Thanks to all for your understanding.



As some of you may know, *Linn's Stamp News* has finally reviewed the journal. For those that don't, the review appeared on page 13 of the February 3, 2003, issue with a headline of:

**'Lambda' says Lincoln gay, blasts 'AP' heterosexism**

What a way to start the new year! I am thankful that they actually read the journal. There are times when I feel that the copies of the journal sent to the philatelic press finds their way to the trash bins.

The review in *Linn's*, I feel, is somewhat misleading. The author of the article does not state that Lincoln was gay. He decried the fact that the *American Philatelist (AP)* article gave more coverage to Mary Todd Lincoln than to Joshua Speed. There is historical evidence, no matter how repressed, that Abe Lincoln and Joshua Speed shared more than just a bed. That Lincoln was gay, it cannot be stated with certainty by anyone. The concept of gay and straight in the 1800's was much different compared to today's standards.

That the *AP* is heterosexist, many mainstream newspapers and magazines are. They routinely publish articles on numerous persons and make a point of mentioning that this person was married with however many children. Many times, this information is totally irrelevant to the article. Yet, they include it. The majority of articles on gay or lesbian figures do not mention that they were in same-sex relationships. *Linn's* published an article in 2000 on Ruth Benedict. The article completely ignored Benedict being a lesbian. Several letters to the editor were published. With the issuance of the Andy Warhol stamp, I do not recall one article in the philatelic press that mentions his being gay. (I could have overlooked it, and I only receive one philatelic newspaper.) The underlying cause of this heterosexism is what is up for debate.

On faction claims that it is because of homophobia. I guess that that can a part of it. If it were truly based on homophobia, I don't think that we (GLHSC) would have been accepted as an APS Affiliate. The *AP*, in their January 2003 issue, published an article written by LPJ contributor Ian Young. "About the Author" mentions his LPJ work and gay related book.

## Cary Grant & Randolph Scott

On October 15, 2002 the U.S. Postal department issued a 37-cent stamp in its 'Legends of Hollywood' series, honoring film actor Cary Grant. The stamp is a likeness of him in a tuxedo, and on the selvage of the sheet is a scene from the movie 'North by Northwest' where Grant is running from a crop duster. I close my eyes and can see the actor running from his many [arranged] marriages and into the arms of his life-long companion, Randolph Scott, the true love of his life.

Cary Grant was born in England, January 18, 1904. His given name was Archibald Alec Leach. The first years of his life were not happy memories for him. His alcoholic father had his mother institutionalized so that he could live with his mistress. He then gave six-year-old Archie to the Lomas family to work as an extra in their acting group 'Pender Troupe.' The group performed in New York City in 1911, then returned to England and engagements throughout Europe. The troupe returned to the U.S. in 1920 when Archie Leach was sixteen years old.

The teenager was thrilled to be in Manhattan. He was befriended by the famous female impersonator Francis Renault, who became his patron. Archie, now 17, met and fell in love with 24-year-old Australian actor Jack Kelly. The two men hunted for an apartment in Greenwich Village. To help with expenses, they rented a room to another gay Australian actor, Charlie Phelps. The trio made many notable friends in the entertainment world. Archie enjoyed a stint with Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey Circus, then another gig with the 'Pender Troupe.' His most embarrassing employment was working as a clown on stilts on Coney Island's Boardwalk.

Back in Manhattan, Jack Kelly and Archie were then employed by Milton Shubert: Jack as a stage-set and costume designer, and Archie as a handsome actor. Archie started dating other men. Jack then left New York for employment with Warner Brothers in Hollywood, as a designer for the stars.

Archie's next male partner and lover was composer and music writer Phil Charig. Archie took and passed a screen-test. He was invited to Hollywood. Both men left Manhattan and drove Jack

Kelly's car across the U.S. to California. They arrived the last week of January, 1932. An apartment on North Sweetzer Ave., in West Hollywood awaited them.

Archie, now named Cary Grant, started work in two films immediately. To improve his manly figure, Cary was advised to begin weight training. Publicity photos were taken of him in bathing trunks, surrounded by admiring young women, and of him participating in various sports that the actor knew nothing about.

Football star Randolph Scott had been discovered by Howard Hughes and lured to Hollywood because of his fine chiseled figure and good looks, but he had no acting ability at all. Cary Grant met this hunk at a studio lunch break. Instantly the two men fell madly in love with each other. Cary's housemate, Phil Charig was not impressed with California, preferring New York City, so he returned to Manhattan.

With the help of interior decorator friends Mitchell Foster and William Haines, Cary Grant and Randolph Scott found a wonderful love nest, and set up a comfortable home. Cary and Scott were seen everywhere together - movie premieres, evening dinners at notable restaurants, and all these sightings brought gossip that the two men were lovers. The studio saw to it that both men were soon married, but marriage did not diminish their love. They divorced their spouses, and were back together again, and then they were made to marry anew and live a 'proper' heterosexual life. Although married several times, in their later years both men were seen together holding hands in darkened areas of Hollywood's gay bars.

# Alice Hamilton: A Policy Pioneer

When Alice Hamilton graduated from medical school in 1893, there was no specialty of occupational medicine. There were no standards for safety at work, and employers routinely fired sick workers and replaced them with new ones looking for jobs.

In a career that spanned 50 years, Hamilton pioneered occupational epidemiology and industrial hygiene. Her findings led to sweeping reforms, both voluntary and regulatory.

She began her academic career in 1893 at the Women's Medical College of Northwestern University in Chicago, and also moved into Jane Addams' Hull House, center of the social reform movement in the US. Through Hull House's well-baby clinic she became acquainted with immigrant families, and learned about parents' unsafe working conditions.

Her first public policy role came during the typhoid fever epidemic in Chicago in 1902. She made a connection between improper sewage disposal and the role of flies in transmitting the disease. Her findings led to reorganization of the Chicago Health Department.

She was asked to direct the governor of Illinois' Occupational Disease Commission in 1910, the first such commission in the world. As a result of its findings, several workers' compensation laws were passed in Illinois. She was asked by the US commissioner of labor to replicate her research on a national level, where she looked at the hazards posed by exposure to lead, arsenic, mercury, organic solvents, and radium, which was used in manufacture of watch dials.

In 1919, Hamilton was appointed assistant professor in a new industrial hygiene program at Harvard, the first woman on Harvard's faculty.

She served on the League of Nations Health Committee in the 1920s, investigating industrial health conditions worldwide, and published the first American textbook on industrial toxins, *Industrial Poisons in the United States*.

After retiring from Harvard in 1935, she became a consultant for the Division of Labor Standards of the US Labor Department. Her survey of the rayon industry led to passage of Pennsylvania's first workers' compensation law. While serving as president of the National Consumers League, she published her autobiography, *Exploring the Dangerous Trades*.

In 1995, when a postage stamp was unveiled in her honor, Harvard Dean of Public Health Harvey Fineberg said Hamilton "was the first physician to use the scientific approach to study threats to health in the workplace."

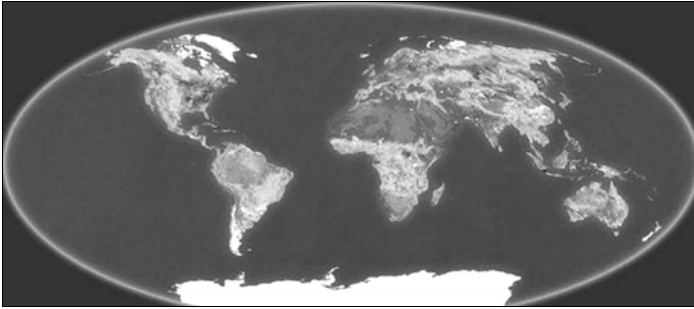

### It's a GAY world...

**Italy** released new Women in Art Type of 1998 stamps with denominations in Euros only on January 1, 2002. Two of the values can be added to your GLBT collection.

*Lady with the Unicorn* by Raphael, Scott no. 2446.  
*Primavera* by Botticelli, Scott no. 2451.

**Macedonia** issued a stamp on April 15, 2002. It features Leonardo da Vinci and the Mona Lisa. Scott no. 240.

**Monaco** issued a stamp on March 21, 2002 featuring Leonardo da Vinci. Scott no. 2247.

**United States** issued the next stamp in the Legends of Hollywood series on October 15, 2002. Cary Grant was the featured actor. Scott no. 3692. See related story on page 4.

## AIDS Update

**Cameroun** issued a stamp in 2001 for the campaign against AIDS. Scott no. 941.

**Macedonia** issued a postal tax stamp on December 1, 2001 for the campaign against AIDS. It was obligatory on mail December 1 - 7. Scott no. RA115.

**United Nations** issued their AIDS Awareness stamps on October 24, 2002. More information will appear in the March 2003 journal.


